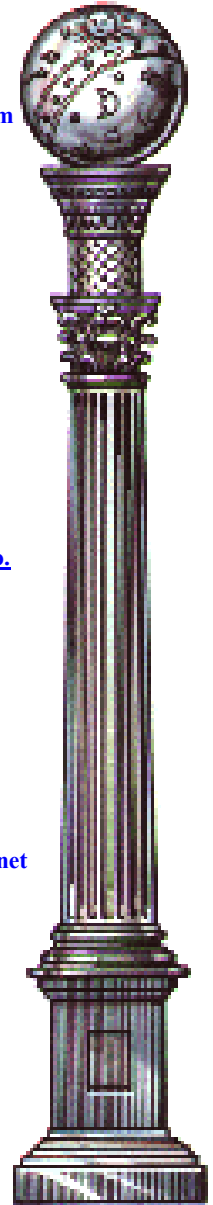

Ft. Hood Police Sergeant once a Worthy Advisor

A year ago on 05 November 2010 Sgt. Munley-Barbour shot a Jihadist within 3 minutes of a call for assistance. Kimberly Barbour Munley, former Rainbow Girl, is being hailed as a hero for bringing down the Fort Hood terrorist shooter while taking three bullets herself. Her former partner Shaun Appler isn't a bit surprised. Appler, who worked with her years ago in North Carolina, says that he began calling her "Mighty Mouse" after she leaped through the air to free him from an assailant choking him and trying to grab his gun. "She saved my life that night" so when I found out the fe- male officer at Fort Hood was Kim, I wasn't surprised. Kim not only has the training, she is mentally prepared to know what to do when you get into that kind of situation."



Officer Kimberly Barbour Munley was a member of North Carolina Wilmington Assembly 29, now Goldenrod Assembly 29, where she served as Worthy Advisor, and also as the North Carolina Rainbow Grand Musician. She was also the holder of the Grand Cross of Color.

Kay Letterman, Supreme Inspector in North Carolina, said, "We are very proud of the courage that this young lady displayed to save so many lives. Sgt. Munley has had two surgeries, but she has survived a shot in the hand and two in her thighs, and without her brave actions, the Ft. Hood shootings would have been far worse.

Our prayers should certainly go out to her and her family and for those she could not save as well. (Always remember those who stand and deliver when needed) Ed.

GRAND MASTER WILLIAM J. BRAY III

Most Worshipful William J. Bray III is a Past Master of North Hollywood Lodge No. 542, having served as its Master in 1979. Brother Bill is also a member of Hollywood Lodge No. 355 and San Benito Lodge No. 211 of California and Kodiak Lodge No. 9 of Kodiak, Alaska.

Brother Bill is married and lives with his lovely wife of 49 years in Chatsworth. They have one son, Bill, a Master Mason, a lovely daughter-in-law and two fantastic grandsons, all living in Minnesota.

Brother Bill served his country in the United States Navy and was medically retired with the rank of First Class Petty Officer. He then joined the family business as Vice President and General Manager of Sky Controls, Inc., an FAA repair station, and finally retired after he and his brother sold the business.

Brother Bill's Masonic career and affiliations are as follows:

He was Inspector of the 524th, the 326th, and the 324th Masonic Districts from 1990 through 1999, with brief interruptions to serve as Grand Sword Bearer for Most Worshipful Stanley M. Cazneaux in 1992, Grand Marshal for Most Worshipful William F. Stovall in 1995, and as Grand Orator for Most Worshipful M. William Holsinger in 2003.

In addition to these three terms as a Grand Lodge Officer and his services as an Inspector, Brother Bill was a member of the Grand Lodge Youth Orders Committee in 1977/1978, a member of the Grand Lodge Film and Creative Projects Committee between 1980 and 1985, Chairman of the Grand Lodge Inspectors' Workshop Committee from 1995 to 1998, and a member of the Grand Lodge Policy and General Purposes Committee from 2001 to 2007.

Brother Bill was elected as Junior Grand Warden in 2007, Senior Grand Warden in September 2008 and Deputy Grand Master in October 2009. Bill was honored with the Hiram Award by San Benito Lodge No. 211 in 2010.

In the Scottish Rite he holds the rank of 33° degree, Inspector General Honorary in the San Fernando Bodies. He is a member of all three of the York Rite Bodies, and a member of Al Malaikah Shriners in Los Angeles and is a Past President of Old West Shrine Club. Other Masonic memberships include The Royal Order of Scotland, The Robert the Bruce Association, and St. Croix Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine. He is also a member of the Allied Masonic Degrees Council No. 105, the National Sojourners, Los Angeles No. 26, Tri-Counties Legion of Honor Shrine Club. He is a Hero of '76 and has received the Honorary Legion of Honor from the Order of DeMolay.

He and his wife, Linda, have been very active in the Order of the Eastern Star. Linda is a Past Matron, and Bill is a Past Patron of Van Nuys Chapter No. 338 and both

are charter members of Dr. Rob Morris Chapter, U.D. In 2001 he served the Grand Chapter of California as Worthy Grand Patron, and served the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star as Worthy Grand Chaplain from 2003-2006.

Brother Bill has also served his community as a Scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 226 in Chatsworth. His son is an Eagle Scout and both are members of the Order of the Arrow. Brother Bill has served as an usher in his church, is a member of the Canoga Park Elks, the American Legion, the Fleet Reserve Association, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Brother Bill received the Man of the Year award for Chatsworth in 1981.

As a follow-up to last month's Trestle Boards we will look at "Those Symbols" by Carl H. Claudy 1924.

THOSE SYMBOLS

"I think I shall have to take an evening off and read a book about symbols!" said the Very New Master Mason to the Old Past Master at refreshment. "I find I don't know all about them."

"When you find the book which teaches you all about them, lend it to me, won't you?" asked the Old Past Master.

"Why, I'm sure there must be such a book," answered the Very Mew Master Mason, surprised. "And I know you know all about symbols, anyway."

"I have never read a book which even attempted to tell 'all about symbols' answered the Old Past Master. "I never knew the Mason who was willing to admit he knew all about them. And I never thought I knew very much about them, although I have studied them for forty years!"

"Why, you amaze me! There are only half a dozen symbols in the lodge; surely they cannot have so many meanings. The tools, the apron, I suppose the pillars on the porch; that's about all, isn't it?"

The Old Past Master turned and looked curiously at his questioner. Satisfied that he was serious, the Old Past Master explained, gently, as to a child.

"I doubt very much that any one has ever had the temerity even to count the Masonic symbols," he began. "Certainly I have not. But there are enough to keep a great many Masonic scholars and antiquarians busy for a great many years to come, as they have in past, trying to dig out of literature, history, archeology, sacred writings, religion, philosophy, and kindred branches of study, a few of the more important meanings of our symbols. Your innocent little catalog of lodge symbols would be pathetic if it wasn't funny, and humorous if it wasn't sad!"

"Certainly you could not have meant to overlook the Great Light as a symbol, and...."

"Oh, but I don't understand that as a symbol," interrupted the Very New Master Mason. "That's the Bible, the Book. I thought a symbol was something that meant something else!"

"It is true that in our American and in British Lodges the Great Light is the Holy Scriptures," agreed the Old Past Master. "But in another lodge, in another country, some other sacred Book may lie on the altar. The important thing is not what book there lies open, but that it be the book which the Masons who kneel before it, venerate as the earthly repository of spiritual knowledge. Thus, to our Jewish brethren, the New Testament in our Great Light is not a Sacred writing as is their Old Testament. Yet our Book contains both. "But the Book of the Law

when used in Masonry is more than a repository of Divine Will and Knowledge. It is a symbol of the fountain head of all learning, and a symbol of a Mason's belief in Deity. It is also a symbol of many other things, of which you will find in the books you will read, but in none of them will you find it all.

"Did you ever stop to ask yourself why Masons circumambulate in the lodge? Or why they perform this rite at various times and in various ways? Or why that rite in a Blue Lodge is always done in one direction? That is a symbol, my brother, and a very beautiful one. It is a connection, tenuous, but very direct, with those far progenitors of Masonry who lived thousands of years ago and worshipped the Sun as the only god they knew.

"It is human to be like those we strive to admire. The small boy plays at being a soldier or a fireman, and struts with a small cane to be like his father. Imitating, we feel that we are like that which we imitate. Our savage forefathers had this same bit of humanness. They believed that when they imitated that which was powerful, they in turn received power. They worshipped the Sun. The Sun, to them, traveled always from the East to the West, swinging north in the summer and south in the winter. Therefore they believed that if they, in their simple prayers and rites, imitated the course of the sun, they, too, would become godlike and have power. Many religions, rites and ceremonies of a spiritual significance have followed in the footsteps of these early men, and thought to find in circumambulation a power which comes from the Divine. Something they worship.

"Of course there are other meanings of circumambulation; these, too, you will discover in the books you will read.

"Not all our symbols are so ancient, although some are even further back in time. You are familiar, of course, with the 'certain point within a circle.' That is a symbol and a great one. It has many meanings; meanings not attributed to it haphazard, but meanings born in it, as you might say. A Mason may not materially err if he circumscribe his passions within that circle, not because the ritual says so, but because our ancient brethren, who actually built Temples and Cathedrals, found that the point, or center in the circle, and another dot or two, were their easiest means of making their squares perfect, and absolutely at right angles. This is a little problem in geometry with which you are doubtless familiar; if not, the books you will read will explain it to you.

"Get out of your mind, my brother, the idea that any symbols in Masonry are arbitrary; that some man said, for instance 'here is an oblong square; I will make it into a symbol which means the lodge, just because I like the shape!"

"The 'oblong square' my brother, was the shape which our ancient brethren conceived the world to be. We use it as the 'shape of the lodge' because the lodge itself is a symbol of the world, and thus of our life in it.

"My brother, symbolism in general, and Masonic symbolism in particular, is a life-time study. It is ever new, never ending.



The more you read and study, the more you understand and enjoy this Masonry of ours. But you will learn it not in one evening or two; not even in many shall you learn it all.”

CAMPING TRIP

In the summer of 1973, I was nine years old, my sister eight, and my brother five. We lived in Camden County, New Jersey, in the town of Audubon. My family's summer vacation that year was a camping trip to the Cape May, NJ area. We had set up our pop-top camper and made camp. On about the second day there, my father was "sick" all day. That would be Tuesday, then sometime early morning on Wednesday my mother decided to take Dad to the hospital. She went to the office of the campground to tell them she would be back in a couple of hours for us as soon as she got dad situated in the hospital. Then she called to tell the office that he had appendicitis and was being transferred to another hospital in Camden county. At that time the lady in the office asked about us, and my mother said she was sending someone to get us. I don't remember seeing that lady from the office after that, she came to the camper and told us that our mom was sending someone for us and to get our things in order. That night we all slept together in the camper and then the next morning we ate peanut butter and marshmallows because the campground staff had turned off our propane tank.

The next day (Thursday) an old couple camping next to us started asking questions, we didn't know what to say, so we lied. We took my brother down to creek for entertainment and to get away from questions and looks. The following day (Friday) we met the Campbell's. Their kids played with us and then they invited us over for lunch. They were vacationing in the same campground. They were from Audubon as well but we had never met them. They said they were friends of the Robinsons with whom we frequently went camping. The father asked a few questions about my family, my father, and my grandfather. He asked where my grandfather lived, etc. The father later told us that when they broke camp that night they were taking us home to Audubon. We went back to our camper and packed up some of our things and Mr. Campbell and I closed up the camper. We rode in the back of their pickup truck and we went to their house for a while. When we arrived home, my Grandfather was glazing in a new window pane in our front door. This seemed odd since the window was not broken when we left. Our Grandmother fed us then gave us the scrubbing of our lives in the bathtub. She stayed at least a week and took care of us. My father eventually recovered and returned home. The next day my mother came home. That was the only time I heard my Grandmother raise her voice to my mother.

Fast forward to 2003.

I am Worshipful Master of the lodge in Audubon. I get a phone call asking if I am "Buddy" Bicking (a nickname used since there were three Harrys in my family at the time), I answer in the affirmative and get "the rest of the

story." Mr. Campbell was a Mason, and based on my Grandfather's residence of Forked River, NJ, he contacted a nearby lodge (Mariners Lodge No. 150) and they contacted him. (My Grandfather was raised in Mariners Lodge in 1964.) Mr. Campbell offered to transport my siblings and I back up to Audubon. My Grandparents then drove up to Audubon. My Grandfather had to brake out a window to get into the house so they could take us in. Who called me? Remember the old couple who were asking questions? A Past Master and a Past Worthy Matron.

VISITING AUCKLAND, NEW ZEALAND

In my experience as a Mason, the greatest 'happening' was in 1990 when my wife and I traveled from Pennsylvania to Auckland, New Zealand for her to attend the World Orchid Congress there.
